

The Scottish Chamber Orchestra is delighted to present *Sir Scallywag and the Golden Underpants* in February 2019! Music in the Round commissioned this piece of music from composer Paul Rissmann, set to the book by author Giles Andreae with illustrations by Korky Paul and published by Puffin.

We invite you to be part of *Sir Scallywag and the Golden Underpants* by using this resource pack in your classroom, whether the children are attending the SCO Family Concert or not. These resources are designed to be easily accessible in the classroom - whether you have five minutes before the end of the day, have an hour to get really creative, or want to link the activity to another subject!

The music is catchy and fun... enjoy!

On <u>Soundcloud</u> you will find:

- All versions of the *Sir Scallywag* song
- All versions of the *Glory Song*
- Disaster! Tune

In the <u>Prezi</u> you will find:

- The composer Paul Rissmann singing some of the songs

Activity 1 Sing

Here are some singing tips:

Before singing the songs with your class, listen to the Soundcloud and pick one song to sing along with. Why not play it to your class too?

When singing with your class, remember to warm everyone up. What about making some sounds from the Palace at night (a snore, a quiet cough, a big yawn)? Or singing a song that the children already know?

Using the music on Soundcloud, remember to sing/ say "Off we go" before the song starts, so that each child knows when to come in.

When teaching the song DON'T WORRY about how your voice sounds, concentrate on the character of the song and encourage your class to do exactly the same.

Activity 2 Making a Soundscape

A soundscape is a sound setting - it helps paint a picture of the story. To create a soundscape, use handheld percussion instruments, body percussion (e.g. clapping or stamping) or voices!

You can use any part of the story, but for this resource, let's use the Palace at night.

 Read a section of the story, or pick one of the pictures with your class. After reading/ looking at the picture in detail ask the children, "I wonder what you can hear happening?" In the palace at night you might hear

> A snore A cough A yawn

You might also hear Stars Mice

What else might your hear? Remember, there aren't any wrong answers!

2. Pick three or four of these sounds e.g. a yawn, some mice and a snore. Practise them with your class. Then split up into groups and give each group a sound. Listen to each group make their sound. Then decide on an order: which group should go first?

For example, your piece might go like this: Yawn Mice Snore Yawn Mice

3. Give your soundscape a structure. Decide on a final order for your sounds. Remember that a sound can come back more than once, and you could have more than one sound at the same time. Once you have a structure that the children can remember, you could

explore 'dynamics' - i.e. volume - by trying out loud and quiet sounds.

- 4. Once you've practised your soundscape, change the order! And why not record it? Or get a child to lead it by acting as the conductor? Getting a child to lead/conduct is excellent for building confidence and having fun. It's also a really accessible way for non-verbal children to lead. Come up with your own hand signs to signal start, stop, carry on, get louder etc.
- 5. Write your soundscape down. What might it look like? See Activity 3.

Activity 3 Make a graphic score

A graphic score is a very accessible way of writing down music. As you create one you will explore the relationship between sounds, drawing and reading. It's also a brilliant way of composing music without realising you're composing music! Have a quick search online to see a variety of graphic scores.

For the purpose of this plan, I've taken the sounds that we used in the soundscape in Activity 2, but you can create a graphic score for any part of the story.

Yawn Mice Snore

Resources

You can either pre-cut some shapes that represent the yawn, some mice and the snore, or get the children to draw and cut out their own.

If you're working with a large group, I'd suggest pre-cut ones, unless you have a lovely member of support staff to cut them out for you according to the child's suggestion in the moment.

Once you have completed this activity, you could get the children to draw their own shapes and photocopy them. If you are going to keep this up in the setting, I'd suggest laminating a large piece of paper (no smaller than A3) and the shapes.

Making a graphic score

1. Recap your soundscape: what was the order?

Yawn Mice Snore Yawn Mice

2. Decide on a symbol for each sound... this can be as abstract or literal as you like! [See note on resources]

e.g. a *yawn* could be an open mouth A *snore* could be zzzzz *Mice* could be... a mouse

3. Get a large piece of paper and using the order of the soundscape, lay out the symbols.

Sound:	Yawn	Mice	Snore	Yawn	Mice
Picture:	Open mouth	Mouse	Zzzz	Open mouth	Mouse

4. With your class, read your graphic score... this could be left to right, or right to left - it's up to you!

5. Pick a child to rearrange the order of the symbols on the paper... can the class perform this new piece?

Furthermore, there's no set rule about how to read a graphic score maybe the symbols are in a circle. Or maybe the symbols are towards the top of the piece of paper...you make your own rules! And why not try it with some handheld percussion?

This activity is one that should be repeated again and again! And why not keep it up in your setting and let your pupils explore it by themselves?

About the Artists

Paul Rissmann (composer) was born on the Isle of Bute, Scotland. His instrument is the (classical) saxophone, which he studied alongside composition in London at the Royal Academy of Music and the Guildhall School of Music and Drama before returning north to the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland.

Paul now writes music, and loves to talk about it, inspiring others to make and perform their own music. His music has been played by orchestras throughout the world including in Australia and the USA. Paul won a British Composer's Award for his piece *The Chimpanzees of Happytown*!
